Police reflect need for safety

In order to reduce accidents to police cruisers and make the patrol cars more visible to the public, the Halton Regional Police are adding reflective markers to the vehicles.

A broad strip of medium blue reflective tape will be put down the side of the white patrol cars. In addition, the new police crest will be reflective along with the police phone number.

Initially the force will start by marking the 18 new vehicles it has ordered, including 12 cruisers with the tape. The cost is \$40 per vehicle.

This will be followed by the marking of the 1983 vehicles, said Robin Hale, administrator

for the force. Along with the reflective marking, the force is going to utilize a lighter blue paint in the cruisers.

Mr. Hale said research has determined the number of accidents with police cars is related to population density. This is reflected locally by the higher number of accidents in Burlington than in other Halton municipalities.

Benefits expected from the reflective material, along with fewer accidents from the greater visibility, include increased effect on reducing traffic speed, greater effect on highway safety, improved relations through higher visibility and a greater deterence of crime, said Mr. Hale.

It is expected the new decor of the car will improve morale as vehicle more "professional" looking.




