Santa's Parade fund needs pumping up

Few people begin thinking about Christmas in October but a certain group would like local residents to get into the spirit of giving early.

The volunteers who comprise the Milton Santa Claus Parade Committee are seeking \$5,000 in donations and another \$4,475 through fund raising activities to finance the annual event.

To date just more than \$1,000 has been received.

The committee has established three money making schemes including a 50 / 50 draw.

Tickets will be available from committee members or Milton Parks and Recreation Department beginning the first weekend in November, tickets will also be sold at Milton Mall Friday evenings and Saturdays.

The familiar "Santa banks" will be placed in more than 20 local businesses to allow for direct public donations.

On parade day, Sat. Nov. 26, special balloons will be sold with proceeds going to the publicly supported event.

Meanwhile, despite the minimal funds received so far the committee has forged ahead with plans and have secured a number of bands, special entries and majorette groups.

The community has already shown its interest in participating, indicated by four entries in the theme float category, two nontheme floats and three walking groups. This
