### Clements aftertop regionjob

Brad Clements will be one of several regional councillors in the race to replace Jack Raftis as chairman of Halton Region.

Ending several months of speculation, Mr. Raftis announced his resignation last weekend from the post he has held for the last five years.

The resignation letter was included in the agenda material distributed to regional councillors on the weekend. On Monday a survey of members revealed several who were difinitely interested in the top spot of local government.

In addition to Mr. Clements, other members who have defintely expressed their intention to seek the chairmanship are Halton Hills councillors Dave Whiting and Mike Armstrong and Burlington member Pat McLaughlin:

Cautious interest was also expressed by Burlington councillors Walter Mulkewich and Rob Forbes, and Oakville representative Keith Bird.

Milton councillor Bill Johnson said he would stand in an election for the chairmanship if someone cares to nominate him, "but I won't go looking for support."

In his letter to councillors, Mr. Raftis said he was resigning from the \$36,000 a year post "for business and family reasons," statements he would not greatly expand on when contacted by telephone.

Employed as a sales manager for Canadian General Electric, Mr. Raftis said he stood for election last year because he expected to serve for the entire three year term, "but things change and now I want to spend more time with the family."

No Pressure

He denied he has been under pressure from his employer to devote more time to his job, noting the last two years have been bad for his company as well as others.

"The company has been very helpful in allowing me to do this for five years, but

## Drugs seized Raid at airport

A unique drug bust that included a raid on an amphibious airplane at Burlair Park has resulted in the arrests of six people and the seizure of more than 22 kilograms (50 pounds) of high grade marijuana worth between \$125,000 and \$150,000.

The arrests and subsequent narcotic charges were carried out last Wednesday through the co-ordinated efforts of five Ontario police departments.

Sergeant Mike Eacrett, head of the Halton Regional Police drug squad, said it was the first time an airplane has been involved in a drug case in this area.

Sgt. Eacrett, along with Halton constables Mauro Succi and Alex Fishbein, searched the plane and seized nine kilograms (20 pounds) of marijuana, following the arrests of two suspects by OPP drug squad officers.

Sgt. Eacrett said the two suspects were observed by OPP surveillance officers near Mohawk Raceway and followed to a north-west Halton location where they allegedly conducted a drug transaction.

Police followed one vehicle into Peel Region where a search warrant was executed at a home and 13 kilograms of narcotic seized. The other suspect was follow-

ed and later stopped by police near Georgetown. Police then searched a motel room at the Georgetown Motor

Inn and discovered a small quanitiy of marijuana. Police forces involved in the investigation included Halton, OPP, Peel, Thunder Bay and

Metro Toronto. Halton Police have charged Robert James Luker, 32, of Bracebridge, with one count each of trafficking in a narcotic, possession of a narcotic for the purpose of trafficking and

possession of a narcotic. He was released on a \$10,000 cash bail Monday afternoon following a two hour bail hearing, during which the snow removal operator was described as an "exceptional father" by his estranged wife, Tina-

May Luker of Freelton. In addition to the \$10,000 bail, Mr. Luker was instructed to stay with his parents in Bracebridge, remain out of Halton except for court appearances and that he abstain from the use or possession of any illegal drugs.

He is due to return to Provincial Court Monday.

Charged in the Peel Region are James Vanzeyl, 32, of Moon Rd., Downsview, possession of a narcotic for the purposes of trafficking; David Vanzeyl, 21, of Fifth Line West, Mississauga, possession for the pur-
