region briefs

Contract at Manor

A Willowdale firm has been awarded a \$149,000 contract for the construction of a new craft-adjuvant room at Halton Centennial Manor.

Regional councillors made the award to Berkin Construction Limited recently, pending approval of an additional \$18,443 in funding by the provincial Ministry of Community and Social Services.

The new facility is to be constructed in the former laundry at the Manor's Pettit House.

Garbage Plan Set

Milton residents will soon have a place to dispose of their garbage without driving to Burlington dump or out onto the rural roads.

Regional council approved the establishment of a container station in the town recently. To be located at the Steeles Ave. public works yard, the facility will allow residents to dump up to 300 pounds of waste without charge.

Salt tests continue

Campbellville residents with elevated salt levels in their drinking water will have to tolerate the problem a while longer as regional officials continue to study the situation.

A solution to the problem is not expected until next year, councillors were told recently.

A new supervisor has been added to the staff of Halton Region.

Councillors recently approved a position for a supervisor of records in the clerk's department to take responsibility for all records keeping and advertising required by the region.

Recruiting for the \$21,500 a year position is to start immediately.


