# Arthritis Society is supported

Milton Lions Club members learned more about arthritis last week when two representatives of The Arthritis Society were guest speakers at the club meeting in Lions

Audrea Lear-Costigan, Chairman of the Milton Arthritis Campaign, thanked the Lions for their recent donation of \$725, which helped put the 1983 fund-raising campaign over its goal of \$8,000. She explained the money will be used for arthritis research and education, rheumatic disease units at the teaching hospitals and to help therapists who do post-operative care visits.

Director of Field Services for The Arthritis Society of Ontario, Mauri Vallee of Kitchener showed a film "The Disease is Arthritis" and gave a brief talk on the scope of this serious desease across Canada. There are three million sufferers in this country and about 2,000 of them live in Milton, he said. Several Milton and district residents are benefitting from the Society's homé therapy service.

Mr. Vallee said there are more than 100 kinds of arthritis but great strides are being made through research and educational

programs.

Arthritis is not just a disease of the elderly, he emphasized. About 30,000 children under the age of 15 are among its victims. It also affects the work force, as arthritis sufferers collectively lose about one billion dollars in wages each year in Canada.

After the presentation at the Lions Club Mr. Vallee was at Mrs. Lear-Costigan's home for a wine and cheese party honoring the campaign workers for their effort on this year's drive for funds.

During the evening he presented Arthritis Society pins of appreciation to Milton Society President Barney Henderson for his three years and to Campaign Chairman Mrs. Lear-Costigan for two years of work.

# Lake noted in survey

The scientific importance of Crawford Lake will be noted in the new edition of the Geology of Canada, a periodically updated volume listing facts, concepts and interpretation of Canada's geological features, published by the Geological Survey of Canada.

Dr. John H. "Jock" McAndrews, Curator of the Royal Ontario Museum in Toronto,

will write the description. "Crawford Lake is of sufficient scientific importance that I have been commissioned by the Geological Survey of Canada to submit an account of the lake's sediments. geology and prehistory for the new edition of the Geology of Canada," Dr. McAndrews

Crawford Lake, located in Halton Region on the Niagara Escarpment near Guelph Line and Steels Avenue in Milton, was formed 15,000 years ago as glaciers retreated for the area. The lake is meromictic; the water only particially circulates from top to bottom, and descending surface water seldom distrurbs the cold, dense, oxygen-low bottom water near the centre of the lake. The lake is 80 feet deep, and has a surface area of only eight

Because of the meromictic condition, sediment is deposited in distinct layers; light colored in summer, and dark in winter. Dr. McAndrews devised a unique sampling technique for obtaining undisturbed sediment cylinders which adhere to a tube containing dry ice.

Dating material found in the sediment samples is as simple as counting down the number of layers from the top. A pre-European Iroquois Village was discovered near the lake after corn pollen was discovered in the layers representing the years 1434 to 1459.






