Bill Champ is trying to provide an alternative for voters on June 2.

Mr. Champ has accepted the Green Party nomination for Halton in the upcoming federal election.

"I was worried about doing more harm for the party than good if I wasn't prepared," said the 25-year-old Georgetown resident. "So far it's been quite an experi-

Mr. Champ said the introduction of proportional representation is perhaps the biggest issue for the Green Party.

He feels that if each party earned seats in the House of Commons in proportion to the number of votes they received, politicians would require broad support to advance courses of action, and small voices would be


He said New Zealand recently moved to this type of government, which also provides for the election of local representatives.

In addition, the Green Party calls for a four-day work week to help ease unemployment, a different way of thinking about work to assist the many contract and parttime workers, a move away from global economies and a more productive way of measuring economic output.

"We agree with cutting payroll taxes, because jobs is the most important issue," said Mr. Champ. "We think it will help the unemployed get off (welfare) benefits."

The 1995 University of Toronto graduate in astronomy and philosophy also said there are social and family benefits to having another day off each week. He said government should forge policies that make additional labour
