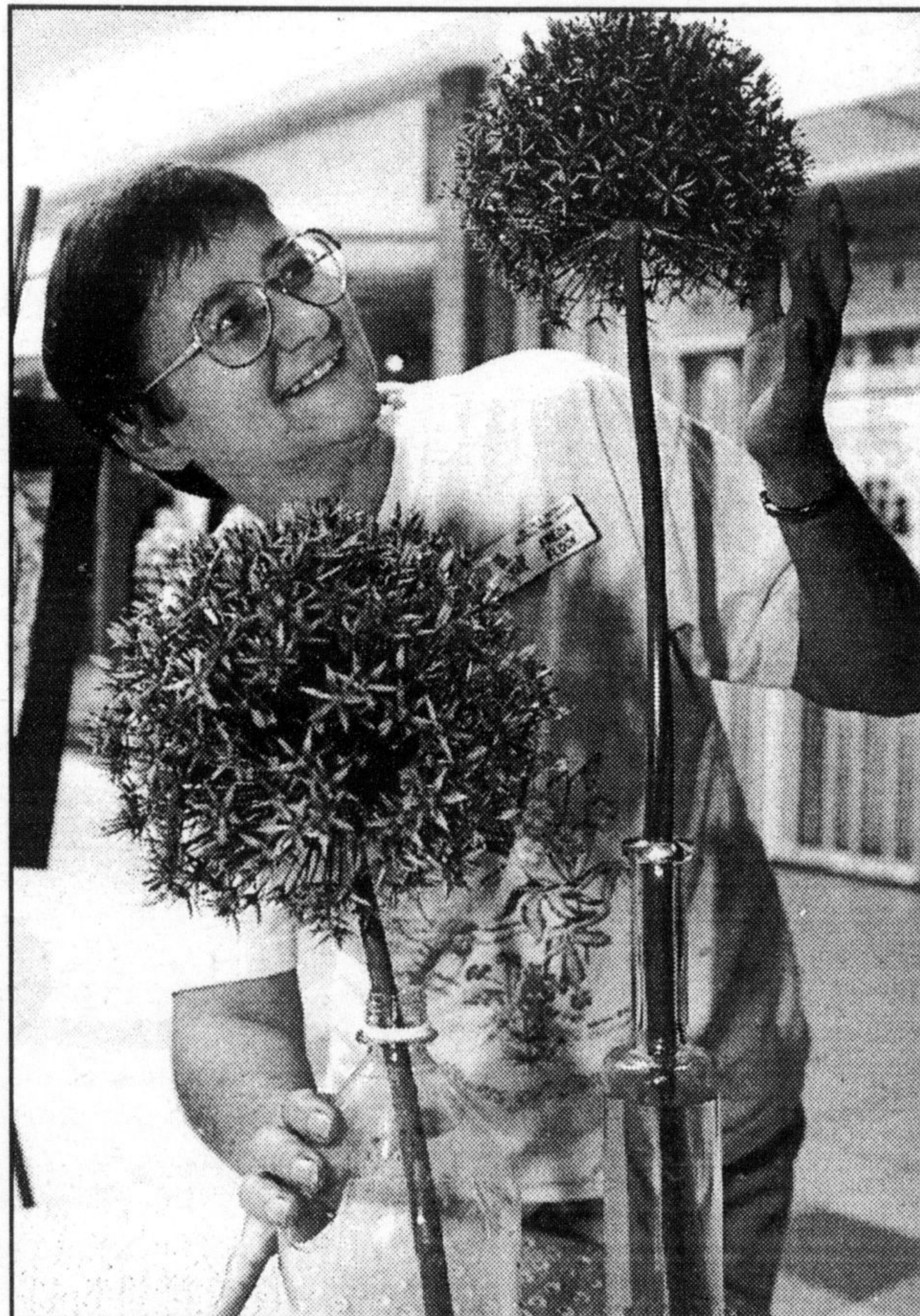

Go to top to challenge topless issue

Saying that 65 per cent of surveyed Ontarians disapprove of women baring their breasts in public, John Challinor called for the provincial government to take action protecting community standards.

Town councillors agreed with their colleague and passed a resolution calling for the Ontario government to challenge an Ontario Court of Appeal decision which has allowed women to go topless if they choose.

Councillors also directed Mayor Gord Krantz to ask federal Minister of Justice Anne McLellan for the legal tools to establish municipal standards bylaws.

"It's a legal activity but that doesn't change the fact that there are community standards," said Mr. Challinor. He acknowledged that the legal right to bare breasts could be accommodated, but said it should not supersede community rights.

In addition councillors passed a municipal policy on how to deal with topless females in public pools and parks.

If there is a complaint the topless woman will be approached, informed that someone feels offended, and asked to cover up. If the woman refuses, municipal staff have been asked to thank the person for her time and walk away.

The staff member will then inform the person who made the original complaint and take no further action. An incident report will be filed to help monitor the activity.

"In the final analysis they can refuse to cover up and there is nothing we can do about it," said Mr. Challinor.

He speculated that the provincial government waited until summer and warmer weather before addressing the issue.

He said the province could legislate municipalities to designate areas such as beaches for this activity.

The only women on council, Marion Howard, suggested that the policies and requests for legislation were "making a mountain out of a molehill."

"The more attention you bring to this issue the more acts of defiance you will see," she said. "This is an issue simply because its different from what we are used to."

The request for legislation and attached municipal policy on complaints passed by a narrow 5-4 margin. Mr. Krantz said he understood there was a topless display in Milton on the weekend, but was unable to furnish any details.
