







Grass roots want a merger

Any merger between federal conservative parties will take time to formulate, if it occurs at all.

According to Rick Malboeuf, Reform Party candidate in Halton on June 2, the stumbling block seems to be the party brass of both Reform and the Progressive Conservatives. In fact, the continued leadership of Jean Charest could ultimately keep the parties apart, Mr. Malboeuf said.

"A merger is wanted at the grass roots level, the problem is the upper echelon," he said. "It might be forced on the leadership of both parties."

Mr. Malboeuf said that with a majority Liberal government there is no immediate pressure to effect a merger. He suggested it would likely take a year before there would be any serious overtures to join the two parties.

And both "may have to swallow a bit of pride and do what's best for the conservative agenda," he said. "However, with Mr. Charest staying on I can't see it."


Ontario, local Reform and Progressive Conservative associations tried to nominate the same person. Both parties came out strongly against the practice.

Preston Manning has held out an offer of merger and key Progressive Conservatives, such as Alberta Premier Ralph Klein and Ontario premier Mike Harris, have indicated support.

Halton Progressive Conservative candidate Ralph Scholtens generally agreed with Mr. Malboeuf.

He said if 10 to 15 Ontario ridings had both the Reform Party and Progressive Conservatives nominate the same candidate, the national leadership "could not ignore" the grassroots position.

Mr. Scholtens said he would continue to be involved with the PC Party. He said a one- year waiting period to see how Reformers fare as official opposition is reasonable.

"If Reform does not perform then any merger idea would be a different thing," Mr. Scholtens said. "I considered them the opposition in the last parliament and they did a terrible job. If this Stornoway thing is any indication they are going to have a rough ride."

Mr. Scholtens was referring to Mr. Manning's decision to move into the house provided for the leader of the opposition. For several years he had vocally shunned the idea as a waste of taxpayers' money.




It's a fuzz buzz.


