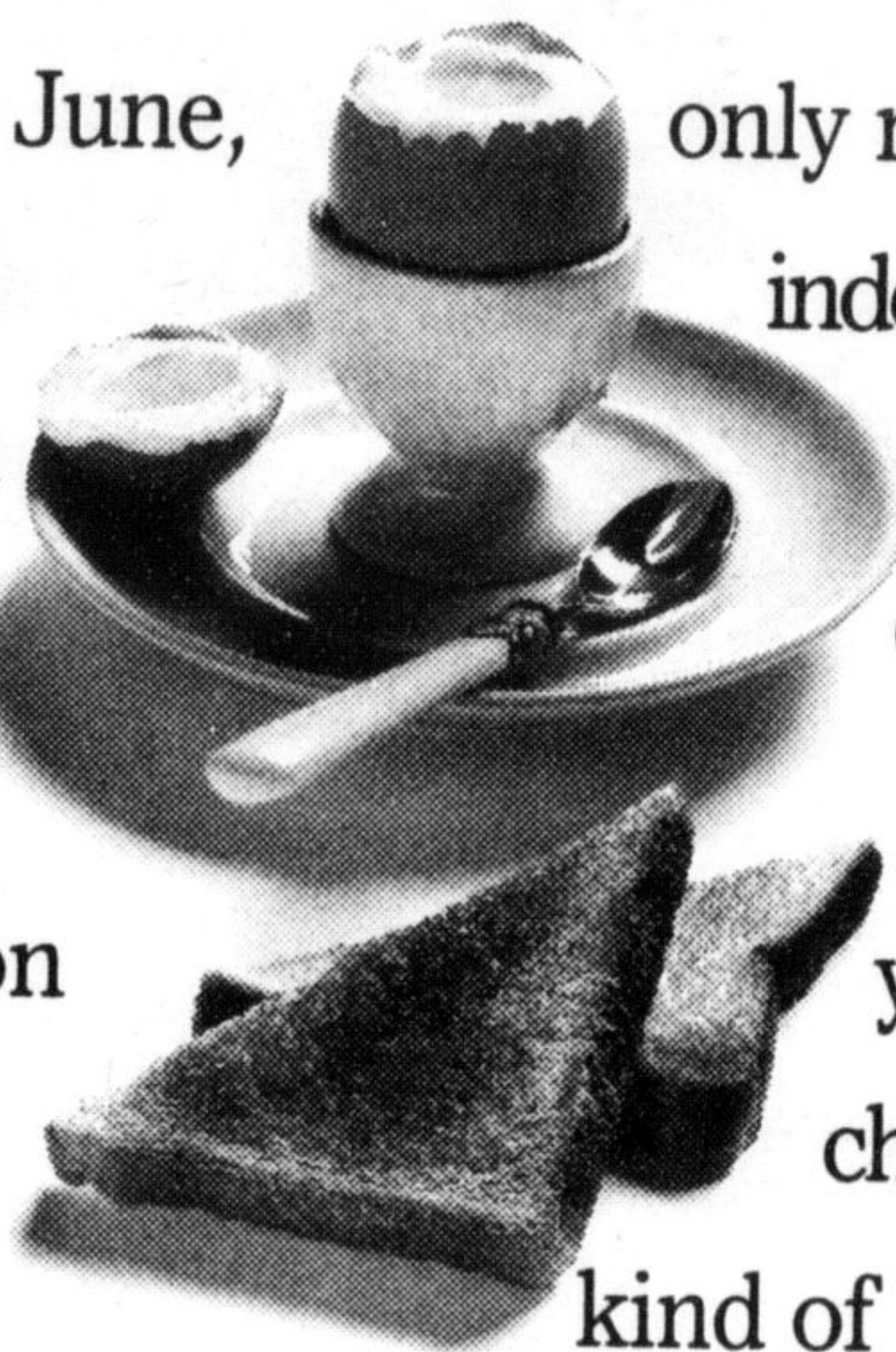

## Competition gets heaved

Caylanne Lyall outdid the competition in every throwing event recently at the Chinguacousy Park Track and Field Meet.

With personal bests in the shot-put (6.86 metres), discus toss (18.60m), javelin hurl (20.33m) and softball throw (29.90m), the 12-year-old Athletiques International Club member collected 1,083 points for an overall first-place showing.

Her closest opponent finished with a score of 809. Even more significant than her gold-medal performance, Caylanne's javelin effort now moves her into the number four spot on the all-time provincial standings.

She sits behind Milton's Marsha Van Cedar (who occupies the top two positions) and Julie Hartling of Bramalea.

Seven-year-old Shannon Laing established two new personal standards — one of which was also an Ontario record. This came in the ball throw, when she hurled the sphere 21.74m to shatter the previous mark by more than a metre.

A 5.45m shot-put effort, 16.2 second finish in the 100-metre dash and 2.51m long jump earned her a total of 1,496 points — almost 200 more than the second-place finisher.

Leading the male participants meanwhile, was Aaron Reese. The nine-year-old placed ninth overall among tyke boys.

He ran the 100m in 16.3s, cleared 3.10m in the long jump, put the shot 6.91m, threw the softball 32.20, and recorded a 1:30.8 finish in the 400m.
