Council boiling down the water question

The question for a referendum on chlorinated water in Milton has been simplified.

Town councillors reconsidered their question at Monday night's meeting. They settled on: 'Are you in favour of the continuous chlorination of Milton's water supply?'

However, they also requested that Halton Region, the level of government responsible for water services, authorize the question to go on ballots in urban Milton during the upcoming November municipal election.

The Region will not be able to deal with the request until meetings reconvene in September.

The original question approved last month asked if voters approved of Milton involving various levels of government in the fight against continuous chlorination.

Councillor John Challinor called the original question redundant, saying the process had already been followed as part of Milton's fight to remove chlorination.

Councillor Colin Best tried to include a fallback position, saying he was fearful that a request for the Region to adopt the referendum question would fail. Council plowed ahead, with Councillor Rick Day suggesting Halton's blessing is irrelevant.

"Let's all work the game called politics and lobby," said Mr. Challinor. "It's not fair that those who want this badly should leave it up to Barry Lee, Gord Krantz and Colin Best (Milton's
