Preservation, conservation of wildlife is applauded

Halton Sportsmen's Association received praise for past efforts and encouragement for future endeavors in the field of conservation Saturday night during the annual wild game dinner and trophy award night at the clubhouse.

Guest speaker Rev. S. Hills of Hamilton said he shared

the concern sportsmen had for the preservation and conservation of wildlife. "Where there are no oxen the crib is clean. Sure the crib is clean, because there is nothing. Are we concerned with nothingness, with a blank entity?" he asked.

He used the analogy

throughout his speech and told sportsmen that there were some forces that would clean out forests and eliminate wildlife in the name of progress.

He likened his philosophy to his attitude in his home. "In my home there is a place for everything and nothing is in its place."

He said that is what made a home rather than a house, and that was the way he wanted it. He encouraged the sportsmen in their fight to preserve places so that animals, birds and wildlife will have a place to live. "We are part of this environment and we don't want a stall so clean and neat that there is no life."
