

Ask weed inspector get tough on owners

Weed inspector Doug Currie was encouraged to go about his job "with all vigor" on agricultural lands within the town during a meeting of Milton's Community Service Committee Monday night.

Mr. Currie attended a meeting of the committee to discuss his function and in particular a complaint from Barlin Construction concerning a bill for \$510 to cut weeds.

Currie advised the committee that the seed act insisted on weeds being cut but did not require any notice to be given to the landowner.

Could be used

Councillor Russ Powadiuk encouraged the inspector to continue cutting weeds, even if the bill was far in excess of the taxes on the land. He noted many acres of land were going to weed when the land could be rented out to farmers and avoid the weed problem.

The committee discarded the idea of registered mail for notification. Councillor Art Melanson suggested a weekly notice in the paper might help.

"You'd have to put in the Globe," chairman Rick Day quipped, alluding to the fact many landowners live in Toronto.

Currie told the committee there were several people who owned large tracts of land and paid bills of \$1,000 to \$1,200 per year for weed control, but wouldn't rent the land.

The committee agreed to consider imposing a surcharge to cover costs of administration. Currie's bill of \$2,586 is hoped to be covered by a surcharge. Weed cutters receive \$10 per hour. Some municipalities charge 25 per cent surcharge on top of the \$10 per hour fee.

The committee agreed to consider a roadside spraying program to control weeds as well.

Hockey coaches support summer school

The idea of a hockey school in Milton received encouragement from Bob (Pie) Lee and Marty Caputo during a meeting of Milton's Community Service Committee Monday night.

Both men were representing Milton Minor Hockey Coaches Association and urged the committee to give favorable consideration to plans for a hockey school in town.

A proposition had been forwarded by Tom Martin, of Milton, a professional hockey player with the Toronto Toros. Martin requested four weeks of ice time, five days a week for four weeks in August.

Reports from Recreation Director Bob Small and Facilities Director Larry Arbic indicated that the proposition wouldn't be economically feasible unless other users of ice could be found.

Both Mr. Lee and Mr. Caputo assured the committee they weren't supporting any particular application. Both indicated that the school should buy at least eight hours a day and run for a longer duration of time.

Mr. Arbic pointed out the ice would have to be in the rink for the month of September as well and this would be at a cost of \$30 per hour. Arbic noted that if a fee of \$9,000 would be levied against a proposition like Martin's, the town would still have to sell an additional \$15,000 worth of ice time to break even.

Mr. Arbic was instructed to seek additional users of ice time and the two hockey coaches agreed to see if some commitments could be made or at least if the interest is there.

Mr. Caputo was certain additional ice could be sold and told the committee the school would be a big boost to the town and to the business section.

The bottom place Chiefs could only interest five regulars in making the trip to Milton for the re-scheduled game.

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

