
Tridents eliminated in fourth game

There are three reasons why the defending Ontario champion Milton Tridents were eliminated in four straight games of the opening playoff series with the Paris 29ers. Paris won in

Paris Monday night 5-3, to take the series. (1) Paris goalie Rick Sims had four hot nights in succession, continually frustrating the Milton shooters. Milton outshot Paris in three of the four games. (2) Not one of Milton's top four goalgetters-Jim Robertson, Garry Nayler, captain Jim Cole and Rick McTrach—had a high scoring series, complicated by the work of goalie Sims. Robertson scored three times, McTrach twice, Cole once while Nayler was shutout. Cole missed two games due to work while Nayler was out one game. (3) The Paris 29ers are a very good Intermediate "B" hockey club—every bit as good as Milton if not better. Tridents were unable to beat Paris all season. They lost four and tied one.

Milton Tridents reign as defending Ontario champions is very quickly drawing to an end with the 29ers likely successors.






