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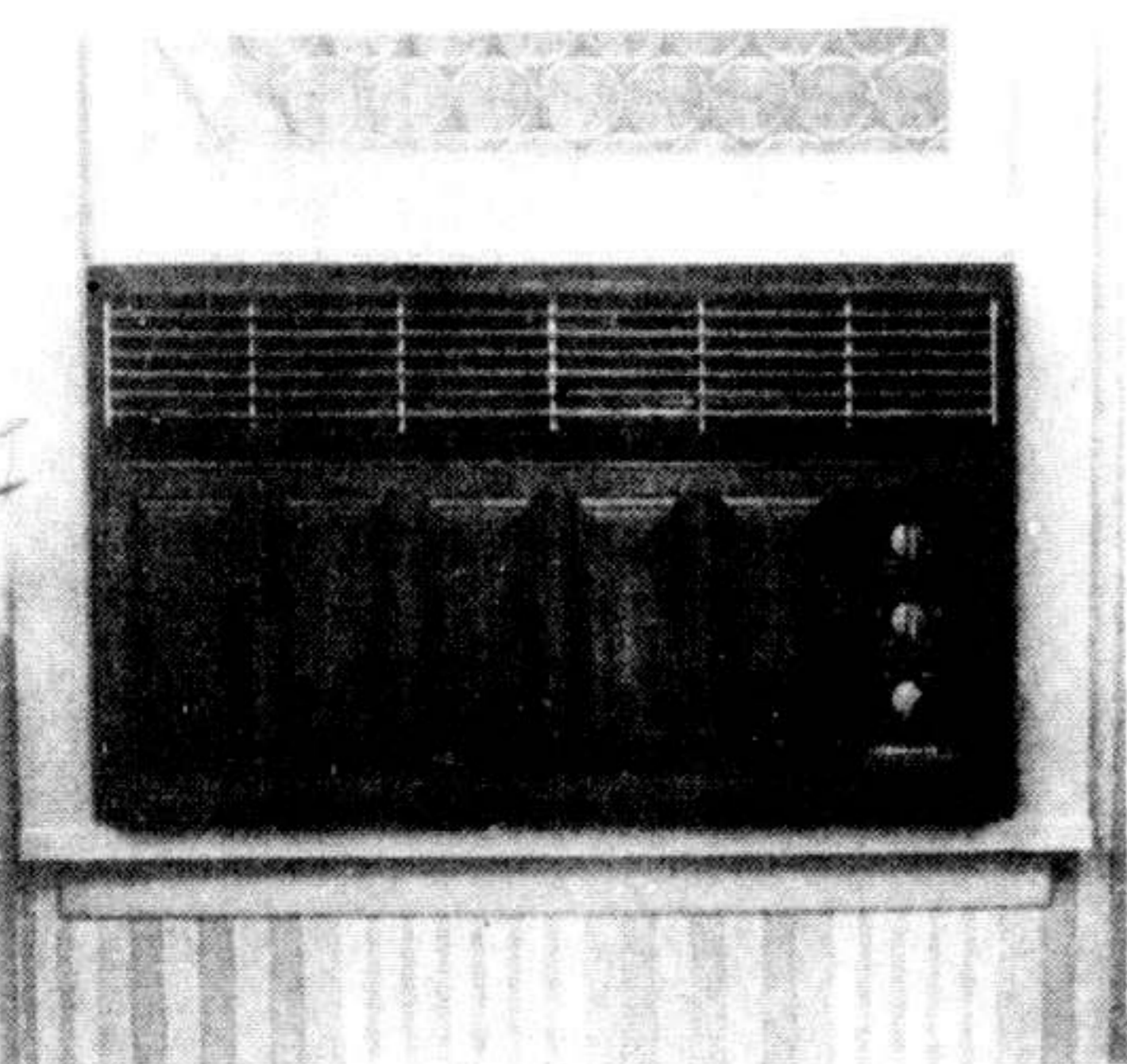
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Trip to Holy Land fascinating

They went for a boat ride on the Sea of Galilee, swam in the Dead Sea—where the salt content is 25 per cent compared to 6 per cent in the ocean.

Hornby 4-H club learns to work with patterns

The third meeting of Hornby South 4-H Club was held in the Omagh church hall on Tuesday evening March 4, at 7 p.m. Nancy Peacock president conducted the business meeting. The roll call was answered by eight members and was to tell one way in which man-made fibres differed from natural fibres. Natural fibres are cotton, silk linen and wool—man-made fibres are produced from chemical elements. Fern Laurence offered to go as leader for a garden club and seven girls signified their intention to take part in this project. There will be four or five meetings and members will learn how to preserve garden produce by canning or freezing.

Leaders Mrs. Patterson and Mrs. Kiernan led in discussion on patterns for dresses, how to make alterations and adjustments if necessary. Using a member's material and pattern the group were shown how to prepare material, to correctly lay on the pattern and cut out the garment. Emphasis was on having straight-of-goods line for the pattern exactly on the straight lengthwise grain of fabric. Girls learned to make tailor tacks to mark darts, seams, pleats etc. At the close tea was served with snacks provided by Helen Opsteen.
