That's all the news for this week and I hope to see you all next week at Youth Bowling.

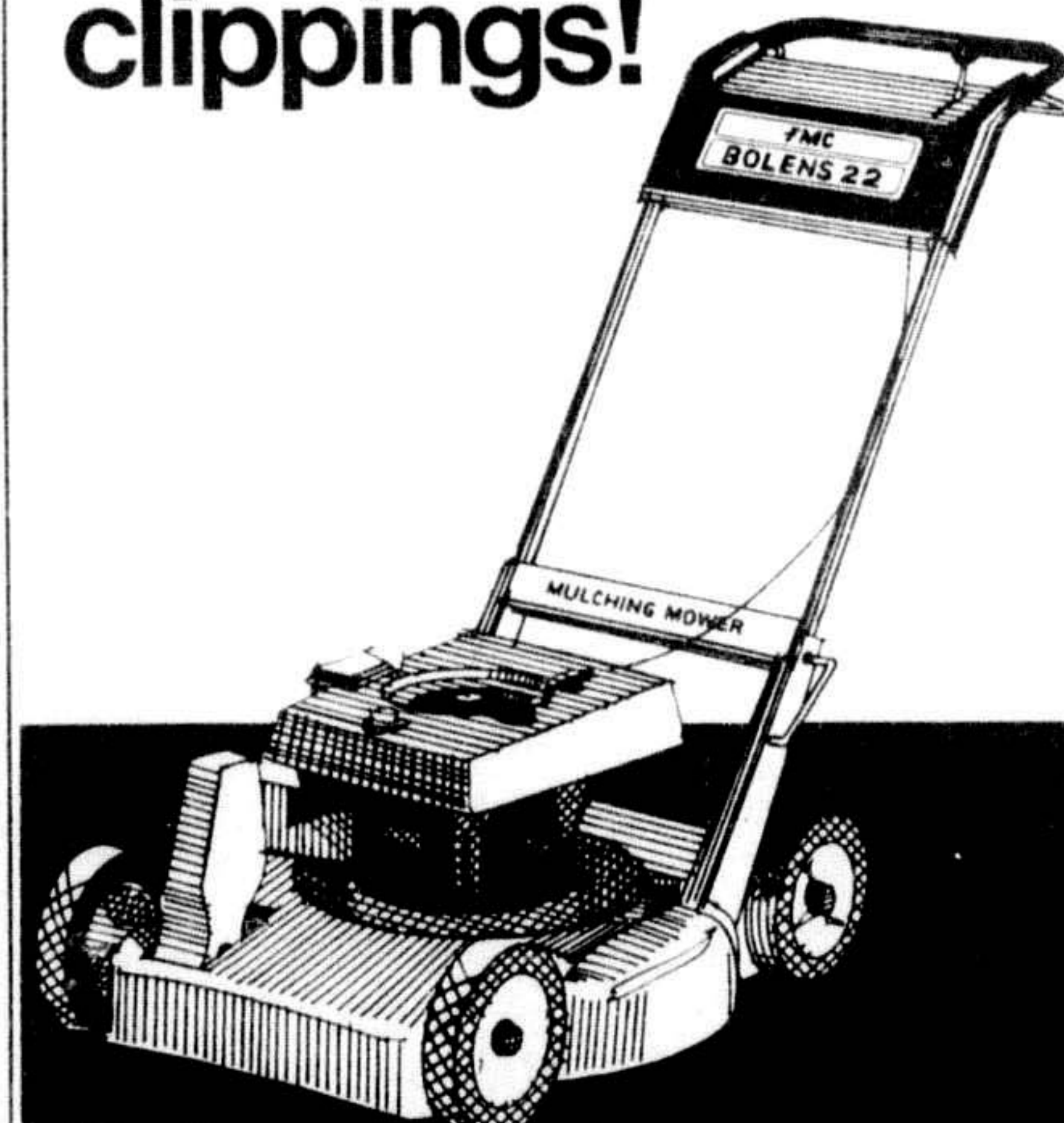

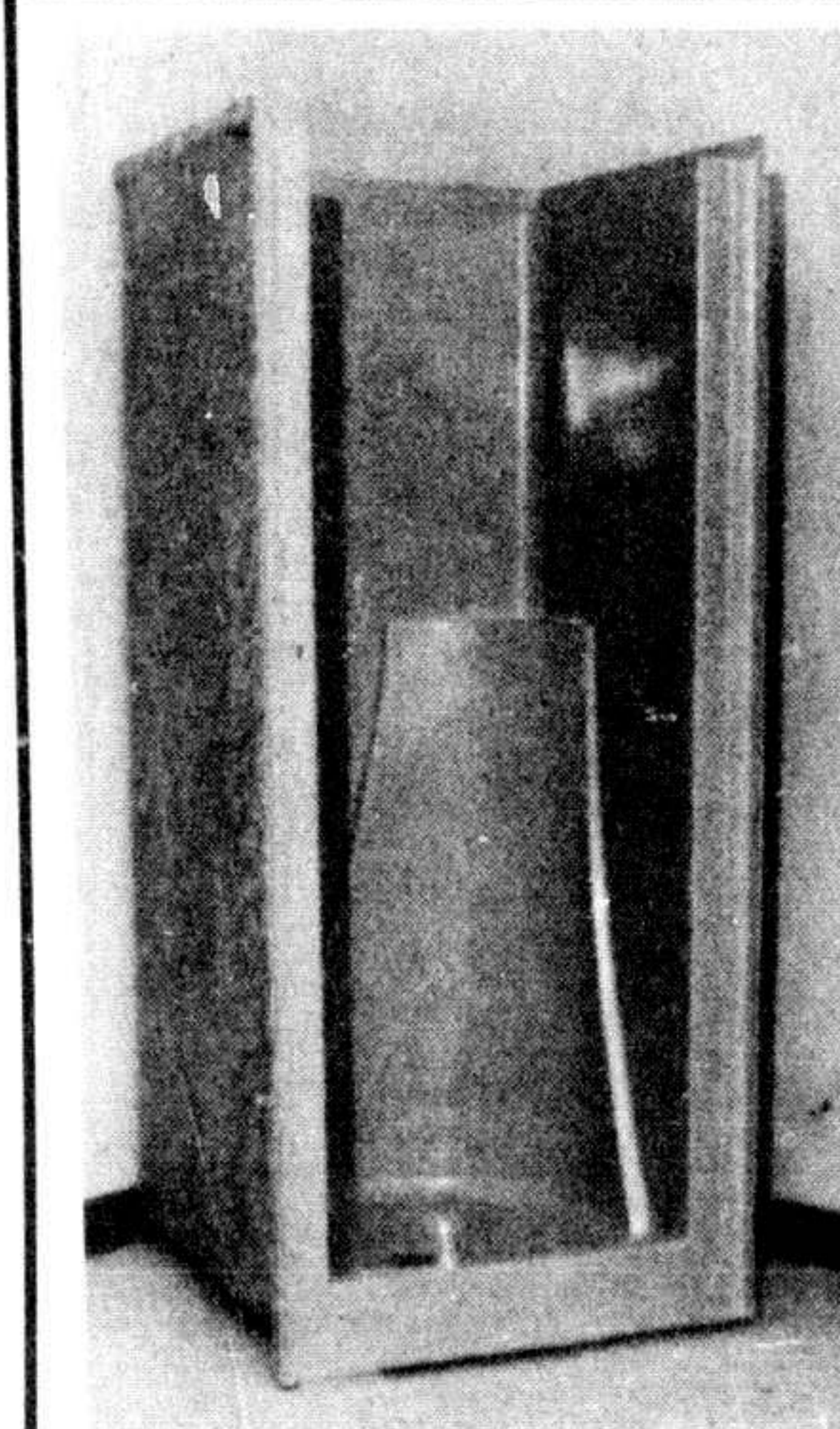

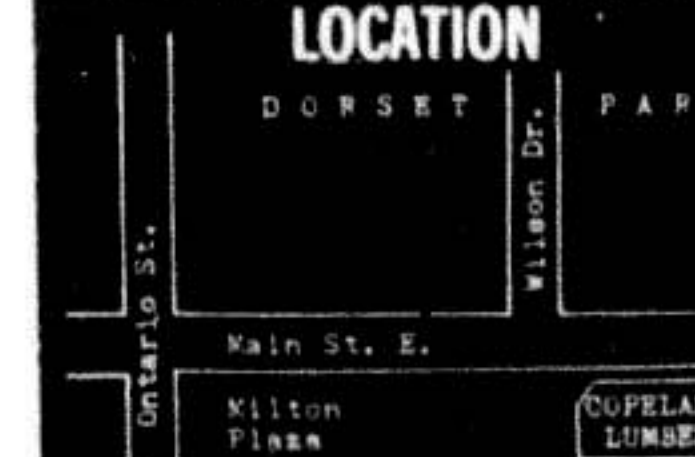
