Hospital puts ban on visitors smoking

"Another patient visited my room with a smelly cigar and it upset me," wrote a former patient at Milton District Hospital to Administrator Ron Woods recently. "I was a hernia patient and suffering too from bronchitis and emphysema," said a woman in a separate letter. "Although I smoked for 30 years I have not done so for four years and the smoke was very hard to take as it affected my breathing."

"Being a patient for eight days," she continued, "there was one time when my roommate had about seven or eight visitors at once. They were smoking cigarettes and not giving the patient the least thought."

One man who had been treated at the hospital was more blunt. "Smoking should be stopped in all rooms," read his letter.

Ban smoking

Such complaints, as well as pressure from groups like the Halton Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association and concerned non-smokers, have prompted Milton District Hospital to ban smoking by visitors except in designated areas. There is no

smoking in patients' rooms.

A publicity campaign was launched last week to spread the word. New signs were posted announcing the ban, and visitors are now told twice daily over the public address system of the new rule.

Mr. Woods said in an interview that a "big chunk" of the

hospital smoking would be eliminated if the visitors can be stopped.

He said a ban on patient smoking too had been considered but rejected as being dangerous. It was feared patients sneaking cigarettes in closets or hiding behind sheets and blankets might start fires.
