The old name of Esquesing


will not be lost. Members of the newly formed historical society made sure of that, Monday night, when they decided the name would be Esquesing Historical Society.

Ottawa Report

In my frequent travels around the riding I am maintaining a vigorous personal dialogue with Halton citizens on the issues of the day.

One issue that is coming through loud and clear is a general concern that our country remain stable and function properly.

This concern cuts across all sectors of society from housewife to corporate executive, and whatever the background and loyalties of the individual.

People obviously want important services such as all forms of transportation and communications to continue reliably, predictably and without interruptions. They want their fellow citizens to act responsibly towards this end.

They understand that our present labourmanagement relations are based on Canadian laws which permit collective bargaining and, if necessary, the right to strike as a last resort. However, they feel that Canada has had too many strikes and too much lost time recently, and that a tough line must be taken towards illegal action.

The situation seems to becoming even more complicated and confusing. Sometimes important services are interrupted without a strike, legal or illegal. For example some postal workers recently were unable to work because they decided not to cross the picket lines of civil service workers on a legal strike. Airlines had to cancel flights because of a combination of winter weather and an absence of personnel

to remove the snow from runways. I myself was caught in this dilemma one Friday night on my way home to the riding. My flight was cancelled at 5:00 p.m., and I arrived home the next day at 8:00 in the morning by train after standing and sitting up all night with crowds of other people. This also meant time lost from my work as an MP, but as a consolation it gave me a valuable first-hand view of the general public experience.

I did not fail to register my complaints with the Minister of Transport, Air Canada and Canadian National Railways.

To make matters worse the groups involved often seem to exploit the situation deliberately these days by staging interruptions of services at the worst possible time, for example during bad weather and at peak periods of travel. Such action presumably is designed to increase public pressure for quicker and more favourable settlements. These actions result not only in inconvenience to the indivudual but in hardships to business and to our economy in

The Canadian people remain fair and tolerant and do not seem to be interested in singling out any particular group responsible for these difficult conditions. They are committed to protect the interests of all parties involved. However they do seem to be making up their minds that they consider essential services to extend beyond those related to immediate safety and security such as policemen, firemen and medical doctors. They now consider essential services to embrace economic and other areas areas which keep this country moving and competitive. They are now looking for alternatives to traditional approaches such as strikes and layoffs.

The increasing general concern for respect for law and order, responsibility to each other, and the reputation of our nation extends to other areas such as crime and violence, regional differences and the working relations between various levels of government and between various powerful sectors of our society.

This is the message I have been getting

from my constituents. The problems we face, along with the opportunities for the future, will require strong, responsible leadership from all of these groups: government, business, labour and the consumers, and cooperation between them all.

The work is now in progress and I believe that our people mean business, including the federal government and its ministers such as the Postmaster General Bryce Mackasey and the President of the Treasury Board, Jean Chretien. Many of my fellow MPs tell me they share these concerns.
