Mrs. Wilkinson first spoke about the Women's Centre. Mrs. Wilkinson was given a mandate from Sheridan College to start the Centre in January 1975. Much of the spade work had already been done by a strong women's going on in the central Halton group at the college. The centre provides resource books for women, government documents telling the legal status of women, "Challenge for Change" movies, and discovery courses for women. Mrs. Wilkinson responds to the

In the first week that the centre was in operation, over 100 women phoned. With slight variations their stories were the same—that they were housewives with no real problems, but they still had guilty feelings.

The topic for the evening was "Sex Role Stereotyping. Mrs. Wilkinson said that many of her ideas were formed while she was in residence at Oxford, England on a Research Fellowship. She referred to Oxford as "the last bastion of male chauvinism". The real question is, how do you change attitudes. Women's liberation is really people's liberation. Women have a power in the home and the school which has scarecly been tapped. We should rejoice in the fact that a person is born, not whether

The results of psychological tests show that girls are kept in subservient positions and taught to be good little girls. By the time they are in Grade 3 girls, when asked what they are going to be as adults, answer in only eight categories. We seem to grow into what people tell us we are going to be. Students should Coffee hour and Bible Study not be counselled the way they used to be.


Remembrance Day always brings back a lot of memories for the veterans...some sad and some happy. Bob Reid of Ontario St. N. was sitting around on the weekend, reflecting on his own first war service and got digging around in some old papers where he found a host of clippings and notes that brought back many memories.

Among them were six clippings about Miltonian Bruce MacNab, who gave outstanding service in the second war. Bruce is probably Milton's only winner of the Distinguished Flying Medal, presented by the King. Bob loaned me the clippings to read and I couldn't resist a brief comment on them. Bruce won the coveted DFM for operations against targets

in Germany, the western desert, Greece, Crete and Sicily. A wireless operator and air-gunner at the time, Bruce became a Flying Officer in the RCAF. His citation read: "His determination and devotion to duty have at all times been an outstanding example to others.

Bruce MacNab's service didn't end with the war, he came home to Milton and has contributed greatly to his community as a businessman, hospital director, Cancer Society president and more recently in his work with the division court.

In this week of Remembrance we should pay tribute not only to those who served and died, but also those who served well and returned home as heroes.
