## Rifle shoot, attack highlight cadet camp

Milton Optimist Air Cadets had a tiring but eventfilled weekend camp at the old army camp in Niagara-on-the-Lake on the Nov. 7-9 weekend. A total of 35 cadets plus eight officers and in-structors went by bus on the Friday and returned home Sunday afternoon, tired but

The first night they set up tents and organized the camp for the weekend. Tents were organized into six flights, each in charge of a corporal and a competition was held between the flights.

Each flight was issued rations for the weekend and was responsible for its own meals. Inspections were held each morning.

It was a lot of fun but ended in cadets charging officers with unfair tactics (using two-way radios and car headlights) and one casualty was reported—Capt. Jim Anderson sprained his

## Laundry payment


The Ministry of Community and Social Services has announced first payment of \$80,000 for a new laundry and garage addition to Halton Centennial Manor home for the aged in Milton.

The Milton home is administered by the Regional Municipality of Halton. The construction got underway this month.


and Instructor R. Losole in charge. The cadets put into practice the techniques learned the previous evening. Points were also awarded in this competition.
