Issue first edition Maplehurst 'Scanner'

"Scanner" is the name of a new in-house newspaper being published in Milton. It's a newspaper designed and printed by and for the staff and residents at Maplehurst Correctional Centre, the new provincial centre in Milton. The first issue came out just before Christmas. Scanner lists eight staffers on its masthead, an editor, a secretary and six others in charge of entertainment, research, sports and humor. Over 100 entries were received in a contest to name Maplehurst's new paper and two residents were named winners—the pair had jointly submitted over 25 different names. The prize was a \$5 gift certificate. Articles in the December

Scanner included a description of the centre's educational program by school principal Fred Baker, a message from superintendent John Main, a report on Milton's Santa Claus parade plus two Champion photos of Maplehurst residents building Santa's float, an editorial by editor David S., a reprint of a Champion editorial column sticking up for Maplehurst after it was publicly maligned by an area man, two cartoons and half a dozen reports on Maplehurst happenings including recreation, entertainment, volleyball and the work of the centre's Alienated Youth Organization.

In his remarks, superintendent Main stresses that in the institution open communication is an integral part of the program and the newsletter will hopefully keep staff and residents abreast of changes and new programs, in addition to providing a vehicle where interested people can demonstrate their literary and artistic talents. Programs at Maplehurst are geared to providing men with skills and knowledge which will enable them to become contributing members of society," he stressed.

Okay \$48,000 study Main - Ontario Sts.

In a dramatic turnaround, Milton Council agreed Monday to go ahead with a \$48,000 study to determine what improvements will be needed at the Main and Ontario St. intersection.

The town's share of the study will cost \$19,000. Deputy Clerk Campbell Thompson told council the town would be under no compulsion to go ahead with the work, once the recommendations were made.

The study will examine the need for road widening at the intersection as well as an underpass and grade separation at the railway. The work involved is estimated to cost over \$4,000,000 and the town's share of that is about \$340,000.

Government priority Mr. Thompson told council the provincial government had given the project priority on its list, but he said the town would either have to go ahead with the study or give up its priority rating. Council voted unanimously to support the study but some

expressed reservations about the town's ability to afford the work, even in 1977 and 1978. Councillor Gord Krantz, one of the councillors who has opposed the project, said Monday it was getting to be like the great national debate. Foresight Mayor Anne MacArthur called on the council to use some foresight and look ahead to the predicament the town would be in if the work did not proceed. She noted the commitment of funds could be deferred when the time came again to consider the capital forecast. Deputy Clerk Campbell Thompson had earlier pointed out the need for council to make a decision on what should be done at that corner. He has said there were applications for development coming in and if the development was allowed it would increase the cost of the project substantially, if council decided to do the work at some time in the future.

Hilton Falls 583 acres more

With the acquisition of 583 acres north of Hilton Falls, Halton Region Conservation Authority now owns a solid block of land over 2,500 acres at the headwaters of the 16 Mile Creek.

According to HRCA manager Murray Stephen the land will be used for cross country skiing, snowmobiling, nature walks and forestry improvement. A wildlife habitat will be maintained. Seventy-five per cent of the total cost of \$579,000 will be born by a \$435,000 grant from the Ministry of Natural Resources. The other 25 per cent has been donated by the Ontario Heritage Foundation. German Co. The Niagara Escarpment

property was purchased from a German company Twin Brook farms. It had been originally acquired by the company for quarrying but was refused rezoning by the former Township of Nassagaweya. It was not licenced under the province's Pits and Quarries Act. Sixteen Mile Creek, supplying a year-round flow for the Kelso and Hilton Falls reservoirs, crosses the property. The Bruce Trail also passes through the area, well wooded with hardwood and mixed forest.
