Okay \$48,000 study Main - Ontario Sts.

In a dramatic turnaround, Milton Council agreed Monday to go ahead with a \$48,000 study to determine what improvements will be needed at the Main and Ontario St. intersection.

The town's share of the study will cost \$19,000. Deputy Clerk Campbell Thompson told council the town would be under no compulsion to go ahead with the work, once the recommendations were made.

The study will examine the need for road widening at the intersection as well as an underpass and grade separation at the railway. The work involved is estimated to cost over \$4,000,000 and the town's share of that is about \$340,000.

Government priority

Mr. Thompson told council the provincial government had given the project priority on its list, but he said the town would either have to go ahead with the study or give up its priority rating.

Council voted unanimously to support the study but some

expressed reservations about the town's ability to afford the work, even in 1977 and 1978. Councillor Gord Krantz, one of the councillors who has opposed the project, said Monday it was getting to be

Mayor Anne MacArthur called on the council to use some foresight and look ahead to the predicament the town would be in if the work did not proceed. She noted the commitment of funds could be deferred when the time came again to consider the capital forecast.

Deputy Clerk Campbell Thompson had earlier pointed out the need for council to make a decision on what should be done at that corner. He has said there were applications for development coming in and if the development was allowed it would increase the cost of the project substantially, if council decided to do the work at some time in the future.

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


