Cops celebrate success of sign program

Being stranded on the roadside is often alarming, but with thousands of "Call Police" signs now in circulation, motorists can breathe a little easier.

Recently Halton Regional Police celebrated the Highway Help Program's success by presenting a ceremonial 200,000th sign to Sheridan College in Oakville. The institution has embraced the program and distributed 1,000 of the bright red safety beacons to students.

"We already offer escort service to cars on campus and these signs which we distributed provide an added measure of security when our students leave our campus," said Sheridan security head Suzanne Gilbert.

The Highway Help program is a province-wide initiative in which the reflective, red plastic sign emblazoned with the words 'Call Police' alerts others while those in a bind remain secure in their vehicles.

After all, says Police Chief Peter Campbell, being stranded can be a frightening and potentially dangerous situation.

Is it safe to get out and flag down passing drivers? Should you walk to a phone? What is the safest way to get help?

Fears also exist for those drivers who may wish to stop and help a total stranger.

The sign, however, easily hooks on the driver's window so passing motorists with cellular phones can call for assistance. Dial *OPP (toll free) or

local police to get help.

"It is another tremendous community program, driven by the community," said Chief Campbell. "It is of tremendous assistance to policing."

Carol Gooding, vice-chair of the Canadian Automobile Association's South Central region, said the CAA receives between 1 million and 1.4 million requests for aid each year. (Figures on cases involving Call Police signs are not known.) This initiative, she added, makes all motorists "partners in assistance.

"We applaud your efforts and are delighted to be a part of this program," Ms Gooding told Chief Campbell.

The initiative is being co-ordinated by the Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police.


