Mr. Best has taken steps to improve his image as the poster child for tardiness. Still spread a little too thin, given his interest in numercommunity




committees, Mr. Best seems unable to drive the agenda despite good ideas and a very open mind.

The councillor from Campbellville constantly rises on "a point of clarification" but those clarifications never seem to lead anywhere. Mr. Brooks is almost always




swimming against the current at council.


furious and prolific letter writing binges cloud issues as often as they illuminate.

Rick Day



Ron Furik


Ron Who? Mr. Furik is a one-issue councillor. He is keenly interested in recreation and leisure issues but merely fills a seat for most other discussions. He seems




rarely speaking as plainly as she clearly would have liked to.

Mayor Krantz presides like a medieval English mayor. He's a great master of ceremonies and keeper of the flame, however, many and ever more vocal are




Barry Lee


