Gerry Brooks sees the end of Milton as it exists today

Gerry Brooks, running for Milton's rural regional council seat, thinks this will be the last term of council in which the town will exist as it does today.


"Everything that's happening now — restructuring, pooling, and downloading will impact us in Milton and Halton," he said. "I can't believe it already hasn't affected us more."

Mr. Brooks said there will be significant changes to governing and municipal boundaries over the next three years.

He said he supports the end of regional government, to be replaced by local municipalities in some new configuration. Remaining towns and cities will purchase major services through the Greater Toronto Services Board (GTSB), he suggested, adding some areas like Nassagaweya should be able to opt out of the Greater Toronto Area (GTA).

"If the province can amalgamate municipalities which share a community of interest, then it follows that they should be equally receptive to excluding those who do not logically belong," he said.

The two-term local councillor said Nassagaweya has common ties with Wellington County and the City of Guelph. However, he said, without factual information on leisure, entertainment and shopping patterns of people in Nassagaweya, it is impossible to know where to draw new boundaries.

Ignoring the issue, as the current council has chosen to do, does not serve constituents well, he said.


"People in Milton pay lower taxes because they have fewer services than elsewhere in (Halton) Region," he said. "Amalgamations tend to cause services to rise to the highest level."

He added that by contracting out services, municipalities can gain the advantages of economies of scale while maintaining services at a locally acceptable

"It's a totally different ball game in the southern rural area," said Mr. Brooks. "People there are more closely aligned with surrounding communities. Many people on the Ninth Line feel they should be part of Mississauga."

All the surrounding development has led to adverse
