The Milton Fire Department extinguished several fires, set in barrels at picket lines Tuesday for warmth, after receiving public complaints about smoke.

But Mr. Chudleigh, who was to meet with the other Halton MPPs and representatives of local teachers' federations yesterday, said the Ontario Teachers' Federation isn't willing to talk.

"It's hard to talk to them when you're sitting in the office waiting for them to come in and no one comes in," he said.

"They're not interested in talking. They want to bring this government down, and they don't mind using kids as pawns."

He added that he believes the majority of Ontarians support the Harris government's educational reforms.

But teachers' federations say Bill 160, the Education Quality Improvement Act, would hurt students by removing teachers' contract limits on class size and preparation time and bringing about the hiring of unqualified people in areas such as computers and sci-
