It's a sigh of relief from hospital board

What was feared by citizens as a ferocious lion threatening to devour Milton District Hospital alive turned out to be more like a pussycat.

The Health Services Restructuring Commission, which released its muchanticipated interim report Tuesday, announced that Milton's hospital will remain open and continue to provide its three main services - in-patient, outpatient and emergency care.

But it won't do it alone. The commission, a group of health professionals appointed by the Harris government to redesign the Ontario health system, called for an amalgamation between Milton and Oakville-Trafalgar Memorial hospitals.

Milton hospital's administration and the board of directors breathed sighs of relief after learning the news.

"While we never envisioned closure as a possibility, we did have concerns that the commission would reduce services more drastically," said hospital executive director Allan Halls, who met with staff, physicians and the board immediately following the commission's announcement.

"The commission's report certainly supports the continued provision of these services here in Milton. By working co-operatively with Oakville under a new corporate structure, we also hope to take benefit from the major re-investments being made in health services here in Halton."

The commission has recognized that Milton residents deserve local access to key services, said Milton hospital board

chair Norm Flemington.

"This is a good result for our community. We will be well-positioned to accommodate local hospital needs as our community's population grows in the future."

Mr. Hall added that Milton and Oakville already share services and have somewhat of a partnership, however the amalgamation will make it official and put more emphasis on improving relations.

Still, Mr. Halls and Mr. Flemington agreed a lot of work is in store for both facilities.

The commission instructed the hospitals' boards of directors to plan the amalgamation on their own and submit a report by May 31, 1998.

"This commission report will clearly involve a great deal of discussion, planning and negotiations over the next few months," Mr. Flemington said.
