Halton Region looking at facelift for Martin House

In one of its last actions of the term Halton's health and social services committee agreed to consider renovating Martin House.

The region will study a refit of the 100-bed longterm care facility, the last vestige of Halton Centennial Manor at Allendale.

Committee has struggled over just what to do with the aging building, which has room to house a total of 150 residents.

Several councillors support the economies of scale associated with maintaining the building and keeping the facility near Allendale.

Others have pushed for a new complex to be built in Oakville or Burlington, where most of Halton's population is located.

The committee agreed to apply for capital funding of the facility and include the project in 1998 budget considerations.

Recommendations on the refit include \$3.3 million in construction options.

Many of the issues involved in the refit appear to revolve around phasing. One suggestion would have the first floor of the building refitted initially and residents moved to free up the second floor to renovate. Third floor residents would be moved to the second floor when it is completed.

However the first floor space is currently being leased to Milton Community Information Services (MCIS).

Pat Heroux, president of Local 261 of the Ontario Public Service Employees Union, representing about 300 Allendale and Martin House employees, said the report has been favourably received by union mem-

She said there was some concern among her group that the renovations would proceed without government guarantees of funding for the additional beds.

Regional social services commissioner Bonnie Ewart said funding announcements are expected by the province next April.

Ms Heroux added that the proposed first phase is

not costly compared to the total project and stressed the need for immediate building improvements, as

The proposed list for initial improvements includes: Hot water controls, outdoor lighting, new kitchen equipment, fire alarm upgrades, additional washrooms, safety grills on windows, and enclosing existing balconies.

Glenn Goldstraw of the Allendale Family Council said his group supports the redevelopment plans.

He said a survey of residents and their families revealed no consensus on what aspects of the building should be addressed first.

"Generally cosmetic things trailed requests for functional needs," he said. "Lets get on with it and start right away."

Ms Ewart said capital funding approvals from the province are very slow. In some cases they come only after the facility has been in operation for several years, she noted.

"If some of these groups had waited to secure funding before proceeding they would be 4 or 5 years down the road and still be without a facility," Ms Ewart said.

Burlington Councillor Jack Dennison said the bulk of the funding for the project will perhaps not be necessary until 1999. He said he was confident funding
