
• Jail guards said a planned expansion at Maplehurst prison will have severe impacts on Milton, its citizens, inmates and guards.

Bill Gillies, corrections officer and president of local 234 of the Ontario Public Service Employee Union (OPSEU), said Milton will be deprived of a potential \$900,000 in annual property taxes which could have been generated through an alternate use of wastewater capacity.


