
# Jacques new in Merchants' net

One Merchants deal came to fruition while another fell apart as Provincial Jr. A League trading came to a close Saturday.

In the tradition of signing French goalies for the playoffs, Milton acquired 19-year-old Daniel Jacques from the Guelph Storm.

Thompson from Barrie — and became somewhat expendable.

In seven games he posted four wins and three losses plus a respectable 2.88 goals-against average.

He spent much of last season as the number one man with Metro's Pickering Panthers and was picked up by the Jr. C Erin Shamrocks for their playoff run.

Jacques replaces David Cinelli, who has been sent to North Metro's Canadians.

"We just didn't feel we were getting the same level of play from David (Cinelli) that we from Jeremy been (Wenzel)," said Milton head coach Marty Williamson Friday night.

One night later his hopes for acquiring rugged right winger Tim O'Brien fell by the wayside.

Burlington's last-minute change of heart put the brakes on the seemingly done deal.

The 20-year-old would have added a lot of toughness to the forward lines — something Milton will need in the later rounds of the playoffs against teams like Brampton and Rayside-Balfour.

Mark Cooper was expected to join Cinelli in North York

but at the moment is in hockey limbo.

His Merchant card has been turned in — as have those of Cinelli, Travis Riggin and Steve Clarke — but he could still resign with the team.

While trading is through for another year, teams can still sign players right up until next month's playoffs begin.

Meanwhile, Jeff Seeds and Jamie Fitzgibbon have been reassigned to full-time duty with Erin, Milton's Jr. C affili-

The move, according to Williamson, will keep them in game shape should their services be required in the play-

#### On a tear

Darren Haydar isn't content to just have his name in the record books — he wants it near the top of the list.

The junior hoopster controlled first-half play at Bishop Reding Thursday. He went 4-for-4 at the line, hit a field goal, scored 17 total points and made half a dozen defensive steals.

But as the tempo gradually increased, Robinson's dominance fell by the wayside — as did the Mustangs' hopes for victory.

He sank just one basket through the second half and his teammates were unable to pick up the pieces. As a result, their initial 12-0 lead went up in smoke as the hometown Royals went on to win 63-43.

"We're a team that needs to play a high tempo, aggressive running game to win," said BR head coach John London. "They forced the change."

Big centre Dan McBride and finesse

guard Joel Castro led Reding's comeback with a fierce inside game and 21 combined

Castro turned in outstanding ball handling throughout the second half while McBride posted up on MD four times in the third quarter to put his team ahead.

Rufus Williamson was another spark plug with several turnovers and crisp passing while Jodie St. John and Onel Martino rounded out the offence with nine and eight points respectively.

Anchoring the Mustangs' meager second-half performance was Rob Skinner, who netted three baskets and finished with 10 points.
