know how to conduct themselves in a job interview or prepare a resume.

"I'm totally frustrated," he told members of the regional health and social services committee.

"Nobody had worked with them and helped them and that was supposed to hap-

Mr. Giddens said to top it all off he has had no contact from the Region about the program since August.

His comments came shortly before the committee was to hear a workfare progress report by Bonnie Ewart, Halton's commissioner of community and social services, who was more optimistic about the program.

"We're very satisfied with the progress we've made in the first year of the program. We've got a long way to go and I think we've had a good first year."

However, the report showed that in the first year of the program only nine welfare recipients found work through the jobfinding component. The projected number

Yet, another 32 people found employment after serving as volunteers in a community placement program. But only 104 people took part in the volunteer segment, which had an annual target of 315.

Ms Ewart couldn't give an answer to Burlington Councillor Jack Dennison, who asked her point-blank why the prospective employees weren't trained.

"I haven't got an answer for that. It could be an individual problem," she said.

She apologized to Mr. Giddens for any lack of communication and said there was no intent to cause ill-feeling.
