

Rural home ransacked

Detectives in Milton are still searching for the thief responsible for a day-time entry to a rural home last fall.

Between 8:40 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Tuesday, Nov. 18, a rear window was forced open at a house on First Line West near Steeles Avenue.

The entire house was ransacked in the search for valuables. Apparently the thief was interested in anything smaller than a piece of furniture.

Cigars, computer equipment, televisions, sports equipment and alcohol were just some of the items taken.

The estimated value of all the stolen property was pegged at \$29,000.

another apartment below her.

Others may notice one or two specks of black in their water if any at all, Mr. Smith said.

While the water is safe to drink, it's not totally harmless. If used to wash laundry, the manganese-laden water can stain clothing or anything else with which it comes into contact.

"The black turns purple," he said.

Ms Coulter said her bath tub was stained.

And more of the manganese will return in the spring when Halton embarks on cleaning out 40 kms (one-third) of Milton's pipeline, Mr. Smith said.

He said residents will be informed through mail and local newspapers when the process begins and ends.

new blood and new money," said Mr. Penman. "We need to get away from insular thinking."

Councillor Wally Hunter said money is not going to come from government but added that perhaps there are ways, such as favourable zoning provisions, in which the municipality can "contribute" to the well-being of downtown.

Ms Wasilkowsky mentioned the ongoing parking woes of downtown merchants and said such concerns will only grow if tourist promotions are successful.

"We could draw more people in using Milton's Victorian charm," she said. "One of the possibilities is to draw people downtown with an evening concert."

Ms Wasilkowsky outlined a proposed 1998 budget which matches the 1997 allotment of \$95,000. She said several special events are being planned including: a Valentine's Day draw, the popular Moonlight Magic Summerfest, a downtown classic car show and street dance, a professional race on foot and on bicycles, the Harvest Moon autumn promotion and a Victorian Christmas event.
