Merchants are struggling in bone dry spell

They've lost three of their last seven games and haven't beaten an above .500 team over that stretch.


Jeff Haydar carried the banner for his family - with kid brother Darren held scoreless - potting a goal and two assists.

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The smile said it all.

It was not unlike the one Darren (Mini) Haydar has worn most nights throughout his sophomore season with the Milton Merchants.

Only this particular grin stretched a little wider — just as satisfaction lying behind the 18-year-olds' eyes ran a little deeper.

Saturday evening in Georgetown, number 17 became the Merchants' all-time single season scoring leader — with a fivepoint performance to move past Jamie Janjevich and his 127point record.

As was the case when he reached the century mark last month, for the second time in as many seasons, Mini surpassed Janjevich's benchmark with a goal — an upstairs backhand at 7:38 of the first to be precise.

The Provincial League scoring leader isn't 100 per cent sure what's made him so successful this season, but does state that having talented teammates and a higher level of confidence has something to do with it.

His number one fan and number one set-up man have their own theories.

"There's no doubt that he's much stronger this year. He wins more one-on-one battles," said father Frank.

Centering a line with Mini off and on this season, Kevin O'Flaherty has often spoken about the right winger's amazingly quick release — noting "passing is what I do best and there's nobody better to pass to than Darren.

"Because he's so talented his strong work ethic is sometimes overlooked, but is nevertheless another factor (in his success)."

Whatever the reason — or reasons — Mini has bolted into the league's record books in a major way.

With four games remaining he sits second on the all-time goal scorers' list with 65, still enjoying an outside shot at first (75), and ranks seventh in total points with 132.

He's also one of only five players, and the first for Milton, to ever post consecutive 100-point seasons — an accomplishment of which he is most proud.
