

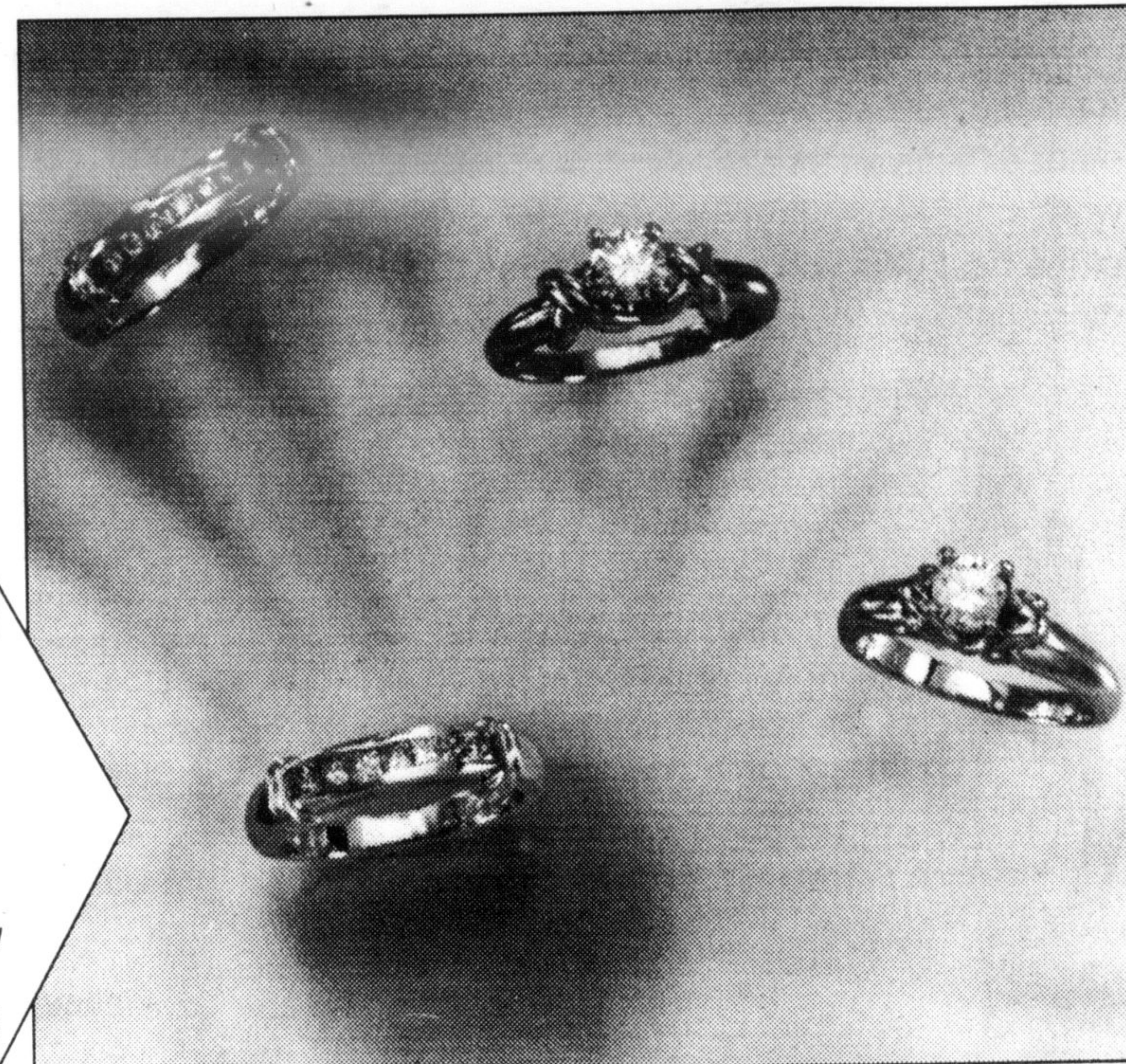
Breakthrough Technology Makes Platinum Affordable

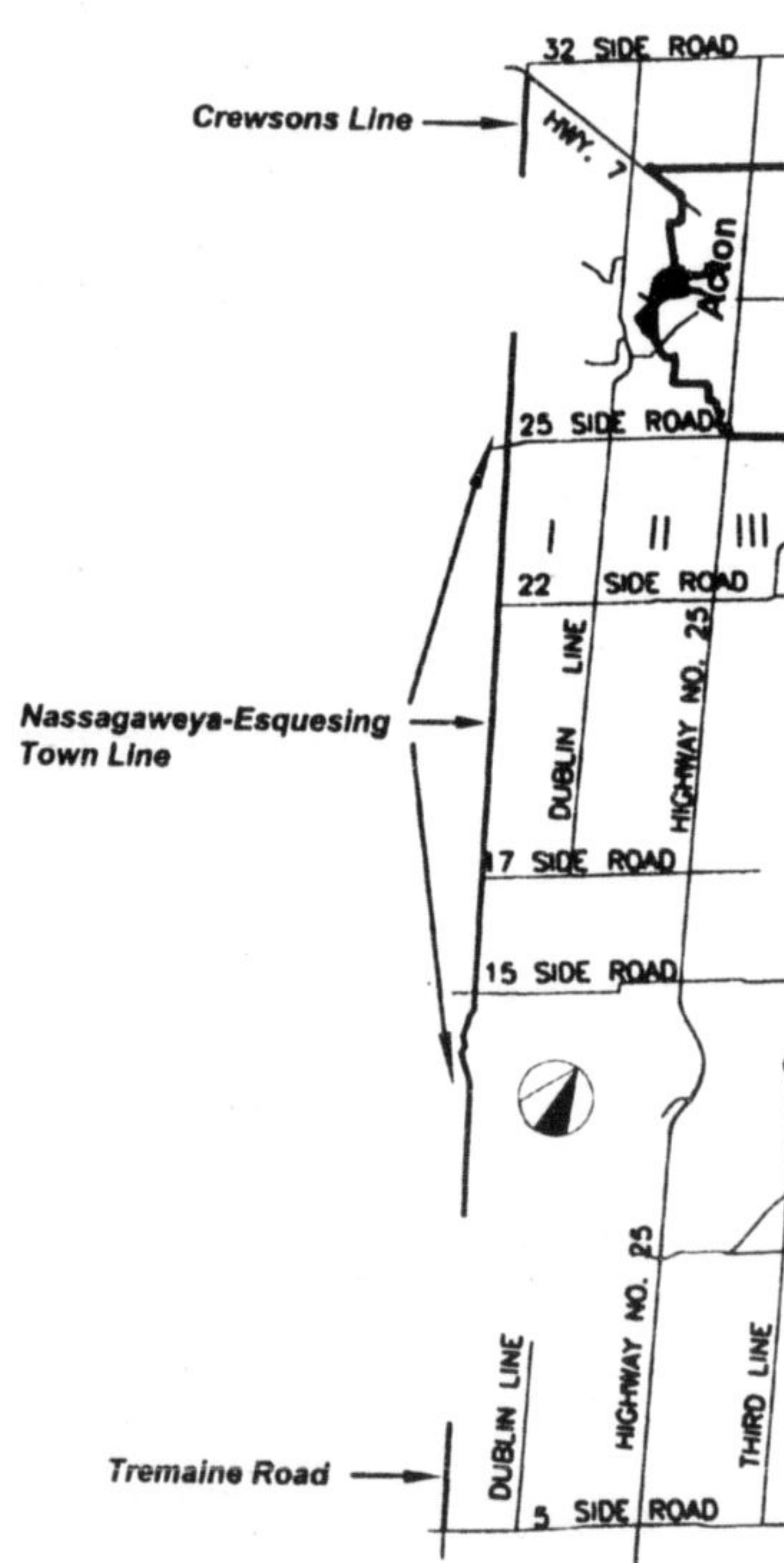
