Merchants can't lock up first place against Blues

The battle for first rages on.

The Merchants had a chance to lock up top spot in the West Conference Sunday, but instead suffered through a power failure and fell 3-1 to Bramalea Blues.

This kept Brampton's hopes for stealing first in the Jr. A loop alive, with just a week remaining in the regular season.

Milton now holds a slim one-point lead, which they'll look to stretch to three tonight at home against Oakville.

The Capitals could take over first if Milton loses and they win their last two outings against Bramalea and Vaughan.

Offensively challenged throughout the afternoon tilt at Victoria Park Arena, the Merchants needed a two-man advantage in the second to spoil Jason Gaggi's shutout bid.

They failed to capitalize on eight other powerplay opportunities and a total of 35

Despite speculation that late-season line changes are the cause of recent scoring lapses, skipper Marty Williamson believes a lack of mental focus is to blame.

"I don't think the shuffling is the problem. They're struggling mentally and deviating from the system," he said.

Blues captain Kyle Amyotte proved to be Milton's biggest nemesis Sunday, as he has all season long.

He figured in a pair of first-period powerplay goals — just four minutes apart and sank an empty net insurance marker in the dying moments of the game.

Scoring for his team were Mike Henderson and rookie of the year Mike Cammalleri. Milton's lone tally came from captain Jeff Haydar with assists drawn by Ron Baker and Kevin Crowe.

Bramalea sophomore Dave D'Ammizio turned in a robust performance and helped neutralize newly acquired Merchant defenceman Raitis (Razor) Ivanans.


The Blues did a great job clogging up the passing lanes and blocking Milton shots while shorthanded.

Friday night the Merchants had an easy time with Mississauga and hammered out an 8-2 decision for their 40th season win.

While not exactly spectacular — even with an eight-point outburst — Milton's powerplay produced three goals, a high over the past several weeks.

Eight different Merchants lit the lamp including supporting cast members John Nadalin, Rich Williams and Jasen Hopiavuiori.
