## Suspect says he no longer owned rifle

A murder suspect told investigators he once owned a .22-calibre rifle, but gave it to his mother, court heard Thursday afternoon.

Keith Madeley, 25, told two Halton Regional Police detectives that he used the gun for rabbit hunting, but got rid of it because it jammed.

"I can't remember if I gave it to her or sold it to her," he said in the 90-minute audio tape played before the jury.

Mr. Madeley, charged in the slaying of 77-yearold Fred Sheppard, was interviewed by police on March 22, 1995 in the bedroom of the Lower Baseline home of Susan and Brian Gagnon.


It was more than two weeks after Mr. Sheppard's bullet-riddled body was discovered in an outhouse at the rear of his Steeles Avenue property. Mr. Madeley, who has pleaded not guilty, told detectives how he was dating Lori Gagnon,

Mr. Sheppard's granddaughter, and living at her parents' home.

He said he would often accompany Lori to Mr. Sheppard's home to perform chores for him.

The jury was sent home Friday after legal arguments erupted during the cross-examination of Det. Keith Woudstra, one of the two officers who interviewed Mr. Madeley.

The trial was expected to continue yesterday.

Confusion in schools is not exclusive to students.

#### Cruiser hit


A Halton Regional Police officer was rammed from behind in his cruiser but still managed to chase down his assailant Sunday evening in Milton.
