"We recognize the need to be cost-effective and efficient and have become increasingly business-like in our approach.

"But our main concern is that we don't lose that strong role for the not-for-profits and that we don't destabilize community care while we're implementing more private delivery of service," she added.


The Halton VON currently employs 66 full-time equivalent registered nurses and registered practical nurses, as well as about 10 support and co-ordinating staff. The nurses provide post-surgical care, assessment and other services to patients in their homes.

About 3,000 patients are receiving care at any one time in Halton, usually for a few days to a few weeks.

The organization, which has operated in the region for over 70 years, started a private arm about four years ago to offer service to clients eligible under private insurance programs. That service has grown slowly but steadily, says Ms Hobbs-Smyth, adding it will continue to grow as competition is introduced into the health care system.

"There will be different ways of receiving the kind of health care that you want," she predicts.

All profits from the private arm of the company are reinvested in community service.
