Long term care for seniors gets shot in the arm

Cam Jackson, minister responsible for seniors, revealed the Tories' plan to provide 650 long-term care beds to combat a shortage in Halton. The plan is to be set in motion immediately.

Oakville's hospital is expected to be one long-term care facility. A site for some of the new beds has been proposed next to the hospital at the former location of Oakville-Trafalgar High School.

Tendering will begin immediately on the 650 new long-term care beds, which will increase the number by 70 per cent.

The plan is part of the Tories' Wednesday announcement that the provincial government will provide \$1.2 billion in additional funding for long-term care.

The province will spend an additional \$43.7 million on beds in nursing homes and homes for the aged in the region over the next eight years.

Over eight years, 1,579 new beds will come to Halton — an increase of 270 per cent over the current 937 beds. This exceeds the Health Services Restructuring Commission's April 27 recommendation of 1,241 new beds by 2003.
