# ECD hangs in with favourite

It took outstanding offence and a sensational south-paw to finally silence the E.C. Drury Spartans at the 11th annual Corbett's Baseball Tournament in Burlington.

And even that couldn't keep them from scoring a moral victory — and a little extra momentum for the start of their regional playdowns.

After chalking up three consecutive wins over a 26-hour period — two by way of blowouts — Drury met up with the Greater Toronto Area's top rated team, M.M. Robinson of Burlington, in the championship tilt Sunday afternoon.

While lefthanded hurler Brandon Cali crippled their early efforts with 11 strikeouts in the first four innings, the Milton crew would not be completely denied.

Persistence paid off in the final frame when Drury scored all four of their runs and finished just three back of the team many feel are destined to reach the Bob Prentice Cup finals next month.

Dave McLean and Jack Turner had the only two hits against the Rams and each scored a run, as did Jed Cosby and Bobby Hicks.

Sharing the pitching duties were John Grisold and Noel Kent.

"Getting those last inning runs against the top ranked team was big. It was a moral victory for us," said Spartans manager Marc Messier, whose team finished first in Halton's Volpe Division with a 6-1-1 record.

Kyle Donnan provided the heroics in the semifinals,

scoring the tying and game-winning runs to complete Drury's 3-2 comeback over Meadowvale.

Stationed at second with one out in the last inning, Donnan got the hit-and-run sign and ended up scoring via the second baseman's overthrow to third on an infield hopper by McLean.

He evened things up one inning earlier on an RBI single by Jon Eidt, whom Turner cashed in with a third-inning double to kick-start their scoring.

Chris Hunt worked the last three frames and was credited with the win. Jamie Walker was steady through the first four innings.

Turner showed strongly behind the plate after regular catcher Mike Austen hyperextended his knee during a home plate collision.

The Spartans' bats were sizzling through round-robin play Saturday, leading them to lopsided cake-walks over Streetsville and Burlington's Lester B. Pearson.

They mercied Streetsville 16-1 in five innings, with Hunt working four innings for the victory. Anthony DiPalma closed things out.

The slugfest featured back-to-back homers by Hicks and Turner in the first and three straight singles by Ryan McHugh.

From there, Walker lashed out two hits for three runs to lead Drury to a 10-1 beating of Pearson. The Spartans scored seven times in the first.

Kent was steady on the mound and earned the win.

Drury has a bye in the first round of the playoffs and will host round two tomorrow (Wednesday) at 3:30 p.m. against either Oakville Trafalgar or Q.E. Park.

Leaping 10.35m in the triple jump for silver was Shawna Turner. Craig O'Neil qualified in three separate junior boys events, earning fourth spot each time. His efforts came in the 800m (2:10.13), 300m hurdles (43.31s) and 4x400m relay with teammates Mike Cerka, Blair McTrach and Jay Suter.

Natasha Hooper ran the senior girls 800m in 2:42.09 for fourth place. Craig Robertson and Jon Sprenger each finished fifth in the senior boys shot-put (12.46m) and junior boys javelin (42.89m) respectively. Last year MD sent 22 athletes to the South Regionals, seven of whom qualified for OFSAA including Merry, Turner and Christie Robertson.

The midget girls competitor struck gold in both the 100m and 200m dash — with 12.8s and 23.7s finishes.

Brooke Johnson turned in the race of the day in the senior girls 800m. She was neck and neck with a Hamilton opponent right until the end but had to settle for silver.

The 18-year-old runner stopped the clock at 2.19 and was over 200 metres ahead of the third place finisher.

Wocker and Johnson were the only South Regional qualifiers for E.C. Drury High.

### Shawnda shines

Bishop Reding's Shawnda Marques is one step away from a third straight trip to the All-Ontario OFSAA finals, following a silver-medal finish at GHAC.

The senior girls long jumper took the runner-up spot with a leap of 4.78m — just shy of the distance she cleared last year to qualify for the provincial showcase.

She and 11 other Royals advanced to the South Regionals, a qualifier for OFSAA, including Carrie-Ann Nichols who took third in the junior girls 3,000m with a time of 11:48.

Luke Brunner also claimed bronze in the midget boys discus, setting a new school record of 34.70m.

Nicole Lee was a three-event qualifier — with fourth-place finishes in senior girls discus (23.80m) and 400m hurdles (81.8s) and a new school record of 19.46m in the javelin that was good enough for fifth.

Midget girls Vanessa Bouskill and Eva Sitarz placed fourth in the 3,000m (13:21) and discus (BR record of 20.20m) respectively.

Finishing fourth in the junior boys triple jump with an 11.15m effort was Jakub Wiktor while Matt Bagley earned an identical placing in the junior boys 3,000m — covering the distance in 11:48.

Bagley, Joel Brunner, Danny Ferreira and Darryl Penson combined to give BR one more fourth-place finish in the junior boys 4x100m relay.

They clocked in at 47.30s.

Bobby McKnight narrowly qualified for the South Regionals with a 53.5s finish in the senior boys 400m, which was good enough for fifth-place honours.
