

# Casino may save track: OJC

one under 19 years of age.

Mohawk, which is already expanding its track to accommodate bigger races, will build a new entrance — one for the track and one to the casino, Mr. Spoor said.

The proposal, which has just come together in the last few months, still has to be approved by town council.

The OJC has applied for zoning and official plan amendments to accommodate the gaming facility and Carnival's headquarters for the 11 charity casinos the provincial government licenced the Miami-based company to open last fall.

The OJC will also need a building permit for the new entrance.

The Town's business development officer, Bob Smith, said most citizens he talked to at the open house were in support of the project.

In May of 1996, the province announced its intention to replace the myriad of existing three-day roving Monte Carlo casino events with up to 44 permanent charity casinos and to install slot machines in all Ontario racetracks.

Based on current projections by the province, Milton-area charities will receive about \$4.5 million per year from the Mohawk casino.

The project is also expected to create about 600 jobs in casino staffing and supplier and construction trades.

If all goes as planned, construction will begin in September and the grand opening will follow in December, Mr. Kates said.
