

Reward for the capture of cannon thieves

The head of the Ontario Renaissance Festival is offering a \$1,000 reward for the arrest of destructive thieves who drove off with a historic cannon, and who are believed to be responsible for other break-ins at the site.

The annual medieval festival on Eighth Line between Britannia and Derry roads has been targeted by thieves three times over its off-season for a loss of more than \$11,000 in property and repairs.

The latest and boldest "senseless" heist was Thursday night, said Ontario Renaissance Festival general manager Adam Smith.

"It started out as a nuisance and it's grown into actual loss of property," he said. "It's very upsetting. We really want it to stop."

The culprits stole a rare Canadian-made working cannon valued at \$2,700 as well as several pieces of expensive construction equipment.

The cannon is hard to replace, but Mr. Smith said he's also concerned that the four-foot weapon is capable of shooting small projectiles.

"Someone who has displayed such poor judgment and behaviour now has a cannon," he said. "It's very real and could be used for that." He said he's also concerned that the heists are becoming more

serious.

The first break-in on the site in October was to a food booth and most of the damage was relatively minor.


The second incident last month was more violent, Mr. Smith said. The culprits forced open a boarded up food booth and destroyed ovens, lighting fixtures and stained-glass windows for a \$5,000 loss.

In Thursday's \$6,000 theft, perpetrators entered a pad-locked storage trailer by breaking through the roof.

A neighbour saw a van backing up into the property at about

Hospital change meeting on Friday


Milton residents can learn more about how the Milton-Oakville hospital amalgamation will affect local health care during a meeting at the Optimist Centre on Friday, June 12.
