Reverend's battle to lift injunction not over yet

cer, effectively throwing the chances of fighting the injunction out the window.

However, a judge made the injunction an issue at Rev. Campbell's trial in Ontario Court (provincial division) in Toronto July 15.

"What he wanted to do was to face the injunction square on," said Judge Milton Cadsby.

"That's what was in his mind, not to obstruct the peace officer. This charge is dismissed.

"I'd just like to add that this charge was not laid until almost two months after the arrest. I don't see why it should take a police officer two months to figure out whether he's been obstructed or not."

The judge also questioned why the injunction, which was deemed temporary when ordered by then Attorney-General Marion Boyd in 1994, hasn't been settled by the Province.

About 35 anti-abortionists on hand at the trial were "elated" with the judge's response," Rev. Campbell

Now the reverend said he believes he has the backing he needs to lift the injunction without getting arrested again, and will lobby Attorney-General Charles Harnick and other members of the provincial government.

"The judge's comments may have been enough to prompt the government to take action without having to go further," he told The Champion Tuesday.

Rev. Campbell was arrested outside the Scott Clinic September 2. Earlier in the day he left the area immediately on a police officer's warning to avoid being charged with obstructing a police officer.

However, he returned about 30 minutes later. He was kneeling and praying when a police officer returned and asked him what his objective was.

Rev. Campbell said he wanted to be charged with disobeying a court order and walked on his own accord to an awaiting cruiser to be arrested.

The Milton man, who ran for public school trustee in the last municipal election, said he was also purposely arrested to support Oakville abortion protester Linda Gibbons, who has spent most of the last four years in jail.

Ms Gibbons, who Rev. Campbell said offers "sensitive and compassionate sidewalk counselling" to women about to have abortions, has been arrested repeatedly outside the Scott Clinic.

Rev. Campbell said he's also calling for Ms Gibbons and others who meet her qualifications to be licenced to provide the service.

During questioning by Councillor John Challinor, Ms Duignan said none of the experts she consulted had been on site. Mr. Challinor asked for verification of the noxious odours and alleged water quality problems.

"We should take a path of some conservatism," said Mr. Challinor. "I don't think that a deep cut at this point in time is prudent."

However, Councillor Cindy Lunau called for a more aggressive approach. She said that when she takes half measures on trimming her garden, weeds always come back stronger.

Ms Duignan said much of the cost of harvesting the weeds and dredging could be borne by the communi-

ty. She said some of this volunteer help had already been lined up.

Mayor Gord Krantz said the Town should pay for harvesting operations since it already has money set aside for the task. It is expected to cost about \$3,000.

However, he conceded the dredging task would be beyond the means of Town Hall.

According to Mr. Thompson, the dredging operation would be a substantial undertaking. The pond would have to be drained and then allowed to dry so trucks could move on it. Given that there is an estimated two metres of silt in the pond, drying could take some time. Mr. Thompson estimated the project could take much of a summer season.

It is hoped that a dredging operation could be organized in the next few years.
