McKichan is named to the Order of Canada

A Campbellville man has been named to the Order of Canada for his contributions to the business world and years of volunteer service.

Now semi-retired, Alasdair McKichan of Guelph Line was notified by mail in May that he had received the honour, but was asked to keep it quiet until an official announcement was made earlier this month.

"I was amazed," he said, recalling his reaction to the news. "I wondered what I had done to deserve it."

Nominated by a colleague, Mr. McKichan, 67, has a long biography of positions held in law and consumer affairs.

Born in Surrey, England, he earned his bachelor of law at Glasgow University and began his career with McGrigor, Donald and Co. of Scotland.

In 1957, he moved to Winnipeg where he practiced law with Aikins, Macaulay and Co.

Two years later he was asked to come on board as general counsel for the North West Line Elevators Association, for which he exercised his reportedly superb negotiation skills in the grain trade.


During this time, he also contributed to the Royal Commission on Transportation, which examined Canada's rail system and made recommendations for improvement.

board member and honourary secretary for the Royal Winnipeg Ballet.




