Sullivan on probation for a post game tussle

For the second time in under a year, a Milton Merchant player has wound up in criminal court for hockey related violence.

Shane Sullivan, 20, was placed on probation for 18 months and ordered to complete 100 hours of community service and anger management counselling for punching Oakville goalie John Lubera in the face after a game last December at Oakville Arena.

The altercation arose in the dressing room area shortly after a heated showdown between the two teams, whose bitter rivalry has been well documented.

The two players traded insults and approached each other before Sullivan let his fists fly.

The former Merchant defenceman received a stern lecture from Judge John Robinson in Ontario Court (provincial division in Oakville) last Friday.

Just four days before the incident, former Merchant Dave Aussem, 22, was given an identical sentence for rendering Bramalea's Chris Heron unconscious with a nasty cross-check during warm-up.

His actions took place during the 1995-96 season.

green when viewed from different angles.

· Look for differences, not similarities.

 Compare the quality of the paper, print and portrait on the notes.

· A genuine bill will have a number of small green discs (planchettes), which can be picked off the paper, leaving a white round circle. These discs glow under ultraviolet (black) light. Simulated planchettes are usually printed on. Attempts to pick them off damage the paper of a bogus note. The counterfeit may also have a waxy feel to it.

· Check for raised printing on the genuine bill. The micro printing on the various parts of the bill should be crisp and clear. (The micro printing is detectable with even an inexpensive magnifying glass. Counterfeit notes normally have flat print, blurred micro printing and often have a shine to them.

· On genuine bank notes, the portrait is lifelike with fine detail, including micro-

scopic concentric circles within the eyes that can be seen with a magnifying glass. On the counterfeit, the portrait generally lacks detail. The eyes appear lifeless.

· Counterfeit bank notes often share the same serial numbers.

• If you are given a counterfeit bill, make note of the passer's description and, if possible, obtain a licence plate number. Call police immediately. Handle the counterfeit note as little as possible to avoid obscuring fingerprints on the bill.
