




BREAKFAST WITH THE MAYOR

More than 100 business people, developers and elected representatives attended the August 11 Mayor's Breakfast hosted by the Chamber of Commerce. Speaking on the subject of "Growth at Long Last" Mayor Krantz, Director of Planning & Development Mel Iovio and

Acting C.A.O. and Director of Corporate Services Jim McQueen laid out in detail the next stages in the process toward significant population growth for Milton. The secondary plans are underway to provide all the necessary behind the scenes framework for growth to occur.

Representatives from the Chamber of Commerce participate on the planing committees and information is shared with Chamber members during regular informal meetings with Town of Milton staff.
