No primary school strike at least until early October

Halton's public elementary teachers won't hold any walkouts at least until after negotiations slated for October 8, says a union leader.

Strike votes taken yesterday (Thursday) and Wednesday in Halton are being used to strengthen the position of teachers' negotiators, said the president of the Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario.

Results of the votes are expected to be made public today.

"A strike vote doesn't mean the next day teachers are out of classrooms," Phyllis Benedict said yesterday. "The talks would have to be at an absolute total impasse before we turn any type of sanction into action."

There would probably be no strikes until well after the October 8 date and then, only as a last resort, said Ms Benedict.

lesson plans for picket lines," she said. "But we need security in working conditions. And teachers and parents want to know how many kids will be in a class and how much preparation time teachers have."

Ms Benedict added the elementary teachers don't want to see their

previous collective agreement stripped.

The union leader said earlier there has been agreement on most non-monetary items, but no deal was reached in areas of staffing, preparation time, benefits and salary. The board is also trying to reduce teachers' preparation time by 40 minutes per week.

She said Wednesday's informa-"No teachers want to trade their tion/strike vote meeting in Milton Tanner, president of the Halton disfor north Halton teachers was well attended.

Teachers' comments strongly endorsed their negotiating team's approach, said Ms Benedict, but she would not speculate on strike vote totals.

The next negotiation date is a few weeks away because the

Halton District School Board is awaiting final numbers for its 1998 short-year budget.

"We're going to wait until they have a stronger financial picture," said Ms Benedict, who agrees with the delay.

Meanwhile, Halton's secondary teachers, who have threatened to participate in rotating strikes, aren't taking job action this week.

Local union representative Al Tanner said no strikes have been called and he's hopeful there won't be one before Tuesday's mediation

Secondary teachers, in about 20 of 31 public school boards, are holding rotating one-day walkouts.

The strikes are being held on a board-wide basis, but are scheduled by the provincial union leaders. Halton's public secondary teachers have promised 24-hours' notice of any walkout.

"I would hope there's no strike before Tuesday, but personally, it's out of my control," said Mr. trict of the Ontario Secondary Schools Teachers' Federation. "I like to think we can go in and hammer out an agreement that day."

The public secondary teachers threatening job action work at boards where their workloads have been increased to seven classes from six over the course of a year.




