RC board head annoyed with both sides in dispute

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Mr. Pece counters that the teachers have offered four proposals to deal with seven of eight class time issues. All, he said, have been rejected by the board.

The latest proposal involved a rotating timetable, which would have seen teachers still only teach three classes daily, but would accommodate reduced instruction in all four of the students' scheduled class-

Can't afford more teachers

Mr. Pece said all the union's proposals have satisfied Bill 160's demands for 1,250 minutes of instructional time from teachers.


But Mr. Sherlock said all these proposals fail to take into account Bill 160's other stipulation of reduced average class sizes (a 22 pupil average).

Mr. Sherlock said the only way to meet this requirement and the extra class time stipulation without hiring more teachers, is by having teachers teach seven of eight classes. The board cannot afford to hire any additional teachers, he said.

Mr. Sherlock fears the dispute is threatening the school year.

Cumulatively, students in Halton's five Catholic secondary schools have lost approximately 47,097 hours in total instructional time for credit courses that have not been taught as a result of teachers' job sanctions.

Mr. Pece contends the Halton board is jumping the gun in asking the province to intervene. "In my opinion going to the government and asking for back-towork legislation is irresponsible on their part," said



Mr. Pece. "In the past, back-to-work legislation has not come about until five to six weeks into the dis-

The person who first received the bad news, and who made the decision to postpone the season, was Sue Amos, instructional leader of health and physical education for the Halton District School Board.


"The reports of 'no' were overwhelming," Ms


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




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
