#### Redden cracks top 10 at worlds

Chrissy Redden said she didn't surprise herself during the latest installment of the World Mountain Biking Championships.

But when you're already one of the top riders on the planet, predictability isn't such a bad thing.

The 31-year-old Campbellville native wasn't overly thrilled with her seventhplace finish in the women's cross-country race — held September 20 in Mount Ste. Anne, Quebec — but certainly pleased.

A total of 90 elite riders competed in the international showcase.

"Obviously I aspire to be better than seventh, otherwise I wouldn't be doing it,"
