#### The Rules of Golf Can Be Your Friend



Perhaps one of the most frustrating things about the game of golf is the many rules and regulations that govern its play. The rules were established over 100 years ago and serve to protect the integrity and sportsmanship of a truly great game.

Knowing your options when confronted with a situation that requires a ruling can greatly benefit your score. In several cases, the player has the choice of two or more options when Play the ball deciding how to proceed. Choosing the best as you find it! option can result in a better opportunity to score. After all, that is what golf is all about.

One of the most common questions I am asked as a Golf Professional is, "What do I do when I have hit the ball into the water?" The explanation is important, because it could save you several strokes. Here in a nutshell is what you need to know:

If the water or marshy area is marked by yellow stakes it is called a "water hazard." It is marked in yellow to indicate that there is room to reasonably drop the ball (if you choose this one option) behind the water hazard. The other type of water area is marked by red stakes and this is called a "lateral water hazard." These are normally found running alongside the golf hole, with no room to drop the ball fairly behind the hazard.

The yellow staked "water hazard" provides you with three options:

- · Simply play the ball as you find it in the hazard!! (Be careful not to touch your club against the ground or anything else in the hazard when setting up.) There is no penalty for playing the ball in this manner.
- Find the point where your ball entered the margin of the hazard. Standing behind this point, line up the point and the flag in a straight line. You may drop the ball on an extension of this line going as far back behind the water hazard as you like along this line. (Remember, this is the option that is not available if the hazard has red stakes and runs beside a hole because you cannot drop anywhere behind it!) The penalty for this is one stroke.
- · Play a second ball as close as possible to where you hit the original shot into the hazard from. (This is like a stroke and distance penalty.) The penalty for this is one stroke.

If the water is marked as a "lateral water hazard" (red stakes) you have the above three options and one more:

• Find the point where the ball crossed the margin of the hazard. Take a tee and mark out two club lengths from this point but not moving closer to the hole. You may now drop the ball within this mark and the point where your ball crossed the hazard.

So if you can see, knowing how to proceed can give you confidence to move forward correctly. It may even save you some penalty strokes and change that double bogey into a coveted par!!

Extreme Velocity is the seventh mare to capture the Roses Are Red and Milton Stakes in the same year.

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
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
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


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
