Blood needed


Canadian Blood Services is asking people with O and A blood types in particular to donate at Thursday's clin-

Milton woman charged with helping alleged kidnapper flee from police

Two people believed to be the occupants of a green van involved in Monday afternoon's manhunt in downtown Milton were apprehended in Campbellville later in the evening.

Halton Regional Police at a Guelph Line business for allegedly helping a kidnapping suspect escape.

The young woman was apprehended inside the business at 6:30 p.m. The green early '90s Plymouth van was parked outside. The man was arrested as he drove into the parking lot in another vehicle at 7 p.m.

Earlier in the day, Halton Regional Police chased down 22-year-old Troy Joseph Metropolit of no fixed address, who was wanted in connection with

last week's kidnapping of wealthy Toronto lawyer Schuyler Sigel, 62, and his wife Lynn, 57.

The hunt, which ended at gunpoint, began after Toronto police officers informed Milton detectives early Monday afternoon that they believed the suspect was in the area, said Det. Sgt. Jackie Gordon of Halton police.

"They said the vehicle may be in the area, possi-

bly the suspect. We didn't know," she said.

Toronto and Halton police soon observed possible suspects in a green van travelling east on Main Street shortly after 1:30 p.m.

However, when a passing fire truck on its way to an emergency call signalled its siren, the van pulled over in front of A Catered Affair, a Main
