A former bank executive, Mr. Gorman and his family moved to Milton from Toronto on Halloween Day, 1971. Then four years later he moved his used car business, which originated in Elmira, to town — at Derry Road and Ontario Street.

"This was in no small way thanks to the co-operation and help of Fred Arnold, who operated his John Deere business from this location," Mr. Gorman recalls.

Mr. Arnold, who left his own business nine years ago and works for Gorrud's today, watched over and tended to both businesses from that location.

In 1982, the company acquired its current Steeles Avenue home — the old Superior Propane property — where both businesses moved.

Gorrud's is genuinely a family firm as, in 1989, Mr. Gorman's oldest son Andrew left university to devote his efforts to the auto business.

"Today he is general manager and has been the driving force in the growth and success of the business," says Mr. Gorman who, himself, retired from the corporate world five years ago and brought his presence to the operation.

"He came on board and never looked back. He's a workaholic."

Andrew was later joined by Mr. Gorman's youngest son Joel.

Mr. Gorman said Gorrud's is far from a stereotypical used car dealership that is "here today and gone tomorrow" and doesn't protect customers from the risk of buying a used vehicle.

He said Gorrud's provides warranties and pays close attention to detail, particularly when it comes to the quality of vehicles for

"They have to meet our standards," he said. "We really genuinely try to make sure that everyone is happy."

Mr. Gorman says he has a fascination with the auto business a feeling he may have inherited from his father, who was general manager of a car dealership.

"The car business has always intrigued me," he said. "Sales intrigue me."


